#### What is the Year of Civil Discourse?

Community members will be trained to engage in difficult conversations that advance community-wide initiatives in Jewish Louisville and promote constructive dialogue across differences. Grounded in Jewish values, this effort is intentionally designed to foster safety, build skills, and strengthen connections. We have partnered with Resetting the Table, a nationally recognized organization that equips communities to have courageous conversations on difficult topics. Their proven approach includes training a core group of community members to engage in, facilitate, and extend constructive dialogue throughout the broader community.

## Why now?

Political polarization, rising antisemitism, and complex debates can strain relationships. Even in the face of disagreement, we are choosing skills, respect, and relationships over division, together. This initiative will strengthen community resilience and allow us to navigate conflict responsibly.
